The Black Death

In 1347 sailors began falling sick & within months the **Black Death** began. 1 in 3 people died!

This was the bubonic plague carried by fleas on rats.

Epidemic- Outbreak of rapid-spreading disease.
Black death killed about 35 million Chinese.

People would panic looking toward magic & witchcraft for cures or wild pleasure.

The Plague

Some Christians believed that Jews caused the plague leading to the murder of thousands of them

People died, production declined, & the cost of labor soared along with prices

Many communities would revolt against the government due to the fear of the plague

After the plague the demand for wages began a worker & consumer revolution for Europe, leading them into the modern age

Crisis in the Church

The Church had to answer the hard question,
“Why did God spare some & kill
others?”

Critics would argue against the wealth of the
church & the moral authority weakened.

John Wycliffe attacked corruption in the church &
believed that the Bible was the source of truth,
not the church

The Hundred Years' War

France & England would engaged in a series of wars that would devastate France & drain England

They argued over who controlled the lands to the North of France.

The invention of the **longbow** turned the tide of war. It fired 3 armor piercing arrows

Joan of Arc- Believed that God sent her to save France. She had many victories & rallied the French

She is captured by England & burned at the stake for witchcraft. She is later declared a Saint.

Results

The French invent the **cannon & take on England offensively.**

England loses the war with France, but sets its sights on overseas ventures.

This would set the stage for the Renaissance, Reformation, & Age of Exploration
