Foundations of English Government

English King had to follow the Magna Carta- A document that limits the Kings ability to tax & guarantees due process

Settlers in Colonies argued they deserved same rights as English Citizens



Types of Government varied in Colonies depending on regions

Colonists also believed in English Common Law- people have individual liberties



Foundations of English Government

In 1689 King James II is overthrown in the Glorious Revolution that replaced him with King William & Queen Mary

They sign English Bill of Rights- New guarantees of freedom & restates the Magna Carta

Rights included Habeas Corpus- No one is held in prison without being charged for a crime

Salutary Neglect- Colonies have self local rule, but have to cooperate with the Crown for economic & war policies

Freedom of the Press!

1734- New York Weekly criticizes the governor of New York

John Peter Zenger is imprisoned for libel (lying in print) even though he didn't write articles



Zenger is freed after 8 months & sets groundwork for freedom of the press

Brand New Ideas

Enlightenment- Movement that believed problems could be solved with human reason

Philosophers search for ideas of "natural laws" that could be applied to government, society, & economics

John Locke- Believed people had natural rights that came from God, not monarchs

Benjamin Franklin- A great thinker for Enlightenment who sought knowledge (founding father)

Religion in the Colonies

Church is very important in the colonies, began the movement called The Great Awakening.

This was the idea that personal religious experience was need for salvation. Preachers would attract large crowds

> This lead to new churches in the colonies & helped influence religious tolerance in the colonies

New beliefs would lay the groundwork for democratic ideas in the colonies
