What is Citizenship?

Citizen- One who owes allegiance to the U.S. & is entitled to both its protection & privileges of its laws

The assumption used to be if you were a citizen of a state, you were an American Citizen

This was challenged, however, with the Civil War and the adoption of the 14th Amendment

Natural Born Citizens

About 90% of the country are people born within its borders

Jus soli- the law of the soil, citizenship is determined by the place of birth

The 14th Amendment protects this & Native Americans were "recognized" in 1924

Jus Sanguinis- The law of the blood, citizenship at birth may be determined by whom one is born

Naturalized Citizens

Naturalization- The legal process by which a person can become citizen of another country

Alien- citizen of a foreign state who lives in this country

Homeland security will analyze alien status for an individual

Sometimes groups have been allowed en mass, such as a territory taken over by United States



Immigration Policies

Congress has the exclusive power to regulate the crossing of the nations borders

Immigration is allowed as long as industry expands & work is plentiful in early days

Eventually quota systems were implemented to curb immigration. Only select few

Deportation- Legal process by which aliens are legally required to leave the country



Government Policies

We do not have an exact number of undocumented aliens in the U.S.

About half of illegal immigrants are from Mexico.

Many illegal immigrants move to bigger cities as its harder to locate them

Illegal immigrants will often work for substandard wages & conditions as employers don't want people to know they are working
