First Shots Are Fired!

The colonies, fearing the worst, began to stockpile arms & ammunition

Britain sends soldiers to Lexington to arrest Patriots & to Concord to seize weapons

Paul Revere rides across the country-side to warn of approaching British & Patriot militias are formed

Patriots & Redcoats meet in Lexington, war begins with The Shot Heard Round The World

Set up for War

Patriot soldiers became Minutemen, & those who supported Britain became loyalists

The colonies join to create The Second Continental Congress to create government for the colonies

Congress gives control of the new Continental
Army to George Washington

Congress argues about independence but send out the Olive Branch Petition, which the King rejects

Colonists Disagree

Most colonists supported new Congress, but preferred British Rule.

Loyalists believed resistance would lead to deadly & destructive war that Britain would win

Loyalists also disliked taxes, oath of allegiance, & militia drafts by the Patriots

American Indians & Enslaved People also applied to Loyalism & preferred British

The Decision for Independence

Colonists are inspired by *Common Sense* by Thomas Paine

The idea for independence from Britain, republican state governments, & union of new states

Republic- Form of government where officials are elected by the people

American model that common people reject kings & aristocrats

The Declaration of Independence

Approved on July 4th, 1776. Declared that America is not longer under British rule

Written by Thomas Jefferson, denounced the King as a tyrant & promoted idea that "all men are created equal."

Congress believed that all men are born with natural rights that cannot be taken away by government
