Suburban Migration

People began to flock to the suburbs because of a shortage of urban housing

Suburbs began to build in a formula to build houses in weeks rather than months

Installment plans allowed people to move in quickly & pay off slowly

The government began to invest in communities by building highways

Car Culture

People began to define themselves by the cars they drove & almost everyone commuted to work

Interstate Highway Act- Funded 41,000 miles of highways to connect nations major cities

Belief this would increase economy, boost nations defense, & strengthen nations prosperity

Drive-in movie theaters & drive-thrus were developed to increase car dependency

Consumption & Consumerism

Consumerism- You buy as much as you want, when you want.

Median Family Income- Average family income, rose almost 2x during the 1950s

People began to buy more on credit "Buy Now, Pay Later!"

Shopping became a pastime for people & new technology such as washing machines & TVs were needed in every home

Families & Communities

The idea of the "perfect family" began. Men were the breadwinners & women stayed home

Nuclear Family- Household consisting of a mother, father, children to make American society

Benjamin Spock wrote Common Sense Book of Baby & Child Care to teach the importance of child care

People began to spend more on their children & pop culture toys became "must haves"

Religion

Church attendance rose from 50 to 80 million & church helped strengthen communities

Billy Graham- Evangelist who traveled the nation to begin religious revivals

Congress added "In God We Trust" to the dollar bill & "under God" to the pledge

Televangelists began to speak to people through the family TV

Educational Opportunities

College attendance almost tripled after WWII, almost 90% of nation had high school degree

The federal government began to fund public schools, guaranteeing free education through the 12th grade

California Master Plan- Set up three tiers of high education: research universities, states college, & community college

Brown V. Board of Education ended segregated schools

Television Shapes Culture

E. B. White wrote "It is going to be the test of the modern world, we shall stand or fall by the television."

TVs sold faster than radios or cars & people stayed home to watch *Howdy Doody* or the *Mickey Mouse Club*

50 million people would tune in to watch shows like *I*Love Lucy

Pop-culture began to affect the dominate culture
