The Peoples of the Americas

Diverse Cultures Emerge

American Indians became culturally diverse & adapted to their locations.

About 375 languages emerged.

Groups subdivided into territories with Chiefs and Elders.

Agriculture Emerges

Wild plants were domesticated, & new types of crops were developed!

a) Examples: corn, squashes, & beans

Permanent villages grew to cities

Calendars were developed & astronomy began with peoples such as the Mayans & Aztecs.

The Southwest Cultures

First farming villages north of Mexico appeared in Southwest.

Agricultural advancements (such as canals) & new governing systems emerged.

New architecture, such as adobes, were built & could reach 3-stories tall!

The Anasazis & Hohokams built large cities & canals.

Famine and drought led to rivalry between the villages

Anasazi became the Pueblo peoples.

The Mississippians


The Mississippi valley contains many water ways & a temperate climate

The people here built large towns & mound pyramids made of earth

Largest & wealthiest city was Cahokia

Large populations led to a social crisis & cultures moved toward the south





Purpose was to preserve peace between member nations and protect areas of settlement from outsiders

Individual
groups maintained
their political sovereignty
and own foreign
policies.

The Iroquois League

A Great Council
helped resolve differences
among groups and maintain
peace with outsiders, but
had no official political
control over members.

Initially, the league included five nations (Mohawks, Oneidas, Onondagas, Cayugas, and Senecas); Tuscarora group added in 1722.
